

#### COUNTIES, CHAP. I.

#### BOUNDARIES.

AN ACT defining the limits of the several Counties in this State. 16 Feb. 1826.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, That all that portion of territory bounded as fol-St. Louis. lows, to wit: beginning in the middle of the main channel of the river Mississippi, due east of the mouth of the river Merrimack; thence due west to the middle of the main channel of the river Merrimack, at its mouth; thence up said river, in the middle of the main channel thereof, to a point where the township line between the townships forty three and forty four, north, crosses the same; thence west with said line to a point in the middle of the main channel of the Merrimack, where said township line again crosses the same; thence up said river, in the middle of the main channel thereof, to a point where the range line between ranges two and three, east, crosses the same; thence north with said line to the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river; thence down said river, in the middle of the main channel thereof, to its mouth; thence due east to the middle of the main channel of the river Mississippi; thence down said river, in the middle of the main channel thereof, to the beginning, shall compose one county, and be called and known by the name of Saint Louis.

SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That all that portion of St. Charles. territory included within the following boundaries, to wit: commencing at a point in the middle of the main channel of





McHENRY Boundaries 16 Jan 1836–28 Feb 1839




McHENRY Attachment 16 Jan 1836–28 Feb 1837


